Communications Board at Columbia Park Elementary School presented by Monica Penner, District Speech and Language Pathologist and Victoria Strange, Learning Support Teacher at Columbia Park Elementary School

Board Chair Chell introduced Monica Penner, District Speech and Language Pathologist and Victoria Strange, Learning Support Teacher at Columbia Park Elementary School. Ms. Strange

began the presentation by providing background information on how the Communication Board came about. She explained that a few years ago she and Ms. Penner shared a classroom and at the time, there were two non-verbal students at the school. Together they developed a core board in order to assist the students in communicating with others. A core board contains "core" words which are hard to teach like "help". The core board also contains fringe works that are specific to an environment such as for camping "trees" and "fire". A video was shown of a student learning to use the core board. After the positive impact the core board had on the non-verbal students ability to communicate not only at school, but also at home, it was decided that it would be helpful for the whole school to be core board literate. Ms. Penner and Ms. Strange went to each class in the school and had each class create their own core board and some were made for outdoors. Classes were provided with certain words that they had to use and then they brainstormed the other words. The words that were most important varied by classroom, for example the Indigenous Education room had "beading" and "hide". There is also a colour scheme for different categories of words. Students did the drawings to match the words. The core board is especially helpful for ESL students and many other students who have difficulty communicating. Following the success of the classroom core boards, Ms. Penner and Ms. Strange felt that making a permanent outdoor communication board would be an invaluable tool for the school and community. They applied for a Variety Children's Charity grant which they received. They also received funding from the school district and the Columbia Park Elementary School Parent Advisory Council. The Board incorporates words that the students wanted as well as words the students use for some of the equipment and activities that are specific to their school. The total cost for the project was approximately \$6,200. The communication board is double sided and has been a big success at the school with students in all grades using it. It is hoped that in the future, each elementary school will have a communication board.

Trustees and Superintendent Kubik thanked Ms. Penner and Ms. Strange for the presentation. Board Chair Chell noted that Ms. Kubik recently provided a presentation on the communication board to the Revelstoke Early Childhood Development Committee (RECD). The RECD would like communications boards in all of the community playgrounds and will be applying for grants for the funding of the communication boards.







The BC Adolescent Health Survey (BC AHS) is a province-wide survey administered to youth in Grade 7 to 12 since 1992. The survey gives an evidence base of youth health trends, emerging issues, and risk and protective factors for healthy development.

STUDENTS IN SD 19 WHO PARTICIPATED IN THE BC AHS

Students in Grades 7–12 in this district participated in the 2023 BC Adolescent Health Survey. They provided demographic information such as age, race, and gender.



INFORMATION: 2023/2024 Final Funding



The Ministry of Education and Child Care (the "Ministry") has finalized the operating grants for 2023/24 based on each district's actual enrolment as of September 30, 2023. There are two additional enrolment count dates in the spring, but they will not impact our district as these counts adjust for changes in distributed learning, significant enrolment swings and other specialized programs that are not offered by our district.

The final 2023/24 grant for our district is \$14,569,702 which is an increase of \$146,032 from the preliminary grants announced last spring. This is also an increase of \$396,157 from our actual budgeted funding as the enrolment submitted to the Ministry in February included projected Offshore Students which are funded separately.

The increase is mainly due to an enrolment growth of 24.14 FTE's bringing the final student enrolment to 1,087 school age FTE's. There was also a significant increase of 6.00 in Level 2 students from projections, plus several smaller changes to other categories in the Supplement of Unique Student Needs allocation.

A detailed comparison of preliminary and final grants is attached on Appendix A. It provides the details on what drove the changes in the funding.

The original estimate of enrolment was completed in February of 2023 and was modified through the Spring as additional students were enrolled. Based on this information, the district anticipated the additional enrolment, so a number of adjustments were made to the staffing contained in the annual budget during the summer. This served to minimize the disruption at the schools after the start of the school year.

The impact of these adjustments combined with the increased funding will be reviewed over the coming weeks as an amended budget is brought to the board for review in February.

The other major funding component is the Classroom Enhancement Funding (CEF), which is not included in our operating grants. It is not impacted by actual enrolment but is based on the actual staffing impact of the class size language. The CEF is the same as it was for 2022/23 other than salary related increases which have been funded by the Ministry.

- Targeted funds to be determined by Board and Indigenous Communities
- Terms of Reference will be set out in a Ministerial Order and will provide a common understanding of the role and responsibilities of the Indigenous Education Council. The district will create a new policy to align with the legislative change.
- 4. First Nations Education Steering Committee (FNESC) Update
 - The importance of learning language was a theme that kept coming up throughout the two days.
 - Jo Chrona
 - Learning requires making mistakes. It is important that teachers know and model that it's better to make mistakes as they move forward with standard nine (educators contribute towards truth, reconciliation and healing.) than to not do anything.
 - o Anti-racism vs not being a racist requires action
 - Be aware of the racism of low expectations
 - Relationship is key. Don't just care, ask yourself "How do they know I care?"
 - Early Numeracy
 - o Importance of using numbers in local language in games
 - o Intergenerational connections when possible
 - Family games nights hosted by schools
 - Math and beading
 - Scope and Sequence building language K-12
 - Kamloops worked with three Nations to co-create three K-12 Scope and Sequence by season. I brought the Secwépemo version home.
 - There were many challenges, but it has provided clear co-created guidelines. Supporting teachers with resources and recognition that the knowledge holders are often paid the least in the district, when they have the knowledge to share.
 - In Revelstoke, we recommend the focus is on the Nsyilxcen language that was used by the Sinixt as well as the Syilx Okanagan. Lisa is exploring the possibility of a Nsyilxcen language teacher to work directly with Revelstoke students and teachers.
 - Recognize that many Nations cover multiple districts and are being asked a lot right now. What level do they want to be involved?

5. Website

- Roberta Kubik will work with Revelstoke Board of Education on a Truth and Reconciliation page.
- The four Nations descriptions are included. We had a suggestion to include a link to First Voice to hear the translation.

- Indigenous Education Parent Consent form is currently included on the site.

Your Voice Matters!

REVELSTOKE, BC – The way you access care for you and your family is changing in Revelstoke. Indigenous people living in Revelstoke can get involved in planning for this new way of receiving primary care and now is the time to add your voice. Primary care in BC has historically been delivered by a single doctor or a group of family medicine physicians out of their clinic. A primary care network enhances care by using a team-based approach, often involving allied health professionals such as social workers, physiotherapists, registered nurses, Aboriginal Patient Navigators, as well as family physicians. A primary care network allows for health care professionals to support each other and work to their strengths. Working collaboratively increases a community's capacity to provide greater access to primary care for people.

Sharing what is important to you and your family's wellbeing will inform service planning for the Indigenous population in Revelstoke. There are three ways to engage with this work:

- 1. **Fill out a survey**. The survey provides important baseline information about the Indigenous population living in Revelstoke. There is a paper copy of the survey available through the Indigenous Friendship Society of Revelstoke (and support to fill it out) or the survey can be accessed online at: https://bit.ly/3PgGG1u
- Participate in a one-on-one conversation. For folks who may wish to share a personal story about their experiences of seeking or receiving care, trained facilitators are available to engage in a confidential conversation with you. Please contact the Indigenous Friendship Society of Revelstoke to arrange to speak with someone at your convenience.

- Participate in a talking circle. Opportunities to participate in a small group setting to offer your thoughts about what is important for you and your family's wellbeing.

"The opportunity to engage in this work and to more fully understand the health care needs of the Indigenous population in Revelstoke is exciting." Says Indigenous Friendship Society Board Member Lisa Moore. "Through sharing of stories, we can express what is important to the wellbeing of our families."
